MONTHLY REPORT FROM THE FOLLOW-UP VISIT TO MBYO ANGLICAN PARTNERS, FEBRUARY 2018

Rationale:

9 August 2017- 10 February 2018 - Half a year (6 months) after the training on sustainable agriculture in Mbyo by Erwin Kinsey, from ECHO East Africa supported by co-trainer Jean TWILINGIYUMUKIZA, CA Technical Officer of MCC& CFGB and Innocent SIBOMANA, Local facilitator.

The training was for 28 cell leaders from six churches in the Mbyo Anglican Church and two other participants from the southern province. This training was financially supported by Christ the Redeemer Church in Norfolk, Virginia. The invitation was facilitated by Rob Slaughter from Virginia and Pastor Andrew KAYIRANGA from the local Anglican Diocese. The training which lasted for three days went very well, various topics were touched on consisting on indoor training sessions as well as hands-on demonstrations.

Jean and Innocent accepted to work with the Diocese to follow up the training with visits to farmers over the next few months, supported by the Church of Christ the Redeemer. This was done almost every month and towards the end of this period, the Church of Christ the Redeemer thankfully proposed to them (Jean and Innocent) to continue to support the follow-up visits of the partners on their farms.

Therefore, Jean and Innocent met again and made their first extension visit and carried out the following activities:

Activity 1: REFRESHER TRAINING

Jean facilitated a review of the last training subjects. It was very impressive to have all the Twenty-one (21) Participants attending remembering some main subjects including and not limited to Conservation Agriculture/farming God's way, Kitchen garden, Nutrition...! And revising some details like the CA principles, six (6) different types of kitchen garden we learnt, and so on. The facilitators emphasized on the role of vegetables in human nutrition and in improving food security status.

Activity 2: UPDATES ON FAMILY FARM ACTIVITIES/PROGRESS

These are a few quotes from so many encouraging words/testimonies that both of us (Innocent and Jean) have heard and witnessed from the Mbyo Partners.

All the participants were given time to tell us about their individual farms. Relevant updates on what they planted, how were the yields/successes and constraints/challenges they faced.

The common planted crops listed by the participants were Amaranths, Chaya, cabbages, carrots, onions, papaya, eggplant, cauliflower, beetroot, nightshade, maize and beans.

They all benefited from these crops where they had enough vegetable to eat in their homes—family consumption, some were given to their neighbors—good culture of sharing and other have taken some to the market for money.

Rainfall has been erratic and many of the participants highlighted lack of/insufficient water for watering their gardens. Some cases of pests and diseases were also reported, but not serious ones.

Activity 3: JOINT-PLANNING: 6 MONTH WORK PLAN

Basing on a projected farming calendar of our partner farmers and as we did the last time, we also discussed and finalized a six (6) moth concerted action plan.

Activity 4: SEED SHARING AND DISTRIBUTION

- As promised last time, Jean shared with the participants the cowpea seeds that he produced in his kitchen garden in Kigali.
- To support continuous vegetable production initiatives and, especially to encourage the partner farmers, the facilitators have helped to buy a few seeds. The seeds purchased and distributed are of: Cabbages, Carrots, Onions and beetroots.

Activity 5: VISIT TO WATER COLLECTION SITE

After the training / meeting, participants visited one of the neighbors who managed to collect the rainwater from the house. This is used to water gardens as well as some domestic uses.
